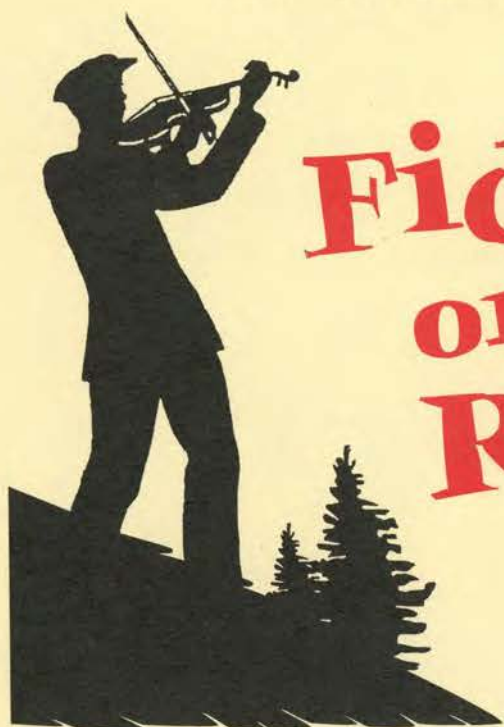

LEGACY OF THE FOREST THEATRE

The Mountaineer Players welcome you as we celebrate **75 years of tradition** at our historic outdoor Forest Theatre by presenting the acclaimed **"Fiddler on the Roof"**. Along with Tevye, experience the timeless conflicts of tradition and love in the face of change and oppression. The survival of the human spirit is joyfully celebrated as we bring the village of Anatevka alive on our stage, and the music will inspire you long after the play is over.

We are a family-oriented, community theatre group dedicated to providing quality entertainment suitable for all ages in a lush outdoor setting. The Players are the oldest theatre company in the Pacific Northwest, presenting shows since 1923.

William C. Darling designed the theatre in 1926, spending many hours in this natural amphitheatre determining how best to use the space. Trees were felled and terraces carved into the slope. Cedar bark was lugged from the creek bottom, and the Forest Theatre, much as we know it today, grew up among its mighty trees.

Serious rebuilding took place in 1947 when the Mountaineer Players returned to the Forest Theatre after an absence of four years due to World War II. Nature had done much to reclaim the theatre and significant efforts were necessary to restore it to its proper splendor. Harriet King Walker described it this way: "It is amazing how far and how firmly a Puget Sound forest can encroach upon a clearing in five (sic) years. Snow and storms had brought down trees across our stage, shattered the wings of cedar bark that had stood for years, while ferns and trees and grass had taken over the terraced hillside of the amphitheater. Our theater was returning to the forest. Art Winder took unto his heart the reconstruction of the stage, and Harry Myers determined that now was the time to carry out a project long dreamed of but never accomplished during the years of the depression, namely, the correct terracing and shoring up of the amphitheater. . . .

"Harry and a small group spent repeated weekends at the theatre. Several large cedar snags were felled and bucked and good sized chunks riven from them. This was heavy man's work, but the women could make themselves useful by lugging the timbers to the theatre, where more heavy work was required in setting them edgewise into the hillside as risers for the steps of the terracing. . . . Meanwhile, under Art's direction, the valleys were scoured for (downed) cedar bark, an extremely scarce commodity nowadays, and the theatre wings were rebuilt."

Kitsap Lodge, the gathering place for Players and friends, was built in 1917 by a crew of Mountaineer women, while the men were serving in World War I. In building the stone fireplace, the women left a niche intended to hold a plaque honoring the Mountaineer men killed in war. No Mountaineer men were lost, so the niche remains empty in celebration to this day!

We are especially grateful to Gardner Hicks who has spent over three decades lovingly rebuilding the trails and theatre, competing with the ravages of nature. It is fitting to take thought of the hundreds of Mountaineers who have, with aching muscles and willing hearts, accomplished the clearing and building, the enlarging and rebuilding that has been necessary from time to time. Hundreds, if not thousands, have given their time and talent to preserve and improve the unique legacy created by the love early Mountaineers had for theater and the outdoors—the legacy of the Forest Theatre.
