Director's Notes

High Button Shoes, produced in 1947, was written by Jule Styne, who later gained his greatest fame writing Gypsy and Funny Girl. This quirky show is where he got started. In addition, Jerome Robbins did the choreography for the show and won a Tony for his work. You are seeing a unique bit of musical theater history here because this show is rarely done. It did have auspicious beginnings, with Phil Silvers and Nanette Fabray starring in it. It ran for almost two years on Broadway. From what we can tell, the last time it was presented in the Northwest was at the Green Lake Aqua Theater in 1955.

The show is a study in how a work of art can pass the test of time in some ways and in others, be obscured by the march of time. High Button Shoes pokes fun at issues as alive today as they were in 1947. Look for jokes about the soundness of investing in land, the fascination with new technology, marketing schemes, beauty products, and marriage. On the other hand, some references are to events of that time, and unless you were there, you may need to read up on some history to understand the humor. The style of humor you will see today is as much of a historical adventure as it is just plain fun. The Keystone Cops were the hottest comedy in the early 20th century, when this musical is set. Today, as you watch High Button Shoes, you may discover that some of the gags you have seen on Saturday Night Live had their roots 100 years ago, with the Keystone Cops.

Finally, I must share with you the thrill I felt the first day our actors donned their Keystone Cop uniforms and acted out the shtick I had seen for so many years in scratchy silent films. Magically, what had been hazy black and white images on film jumped alive on stage right here in the Kitsap Forest Theater. Through this art form called live theater, we get to experience a sort of time machine effect that connects us with live images of days gone by. ~ Craig Schieber
