COSTUMES AND PROPS

The costumes in this show were designed by Magz Ross, a Calgary based costume designer and artist, for StoryBook Theatre in Calgary, AB. She has been involved in costuming for decades, and studied textiles and design in Aberdeen, Scotland.

The costumes/props have traveled from StoryBook Theatre to two theaters in Alberta, to a theater in Victoria, to us, and then will be traveling back to Alberta for a 6th production. Each theater has adjusted and mended the costumes as needed. The huge prop horse was built by a high school in Alberta. We have more dancers than available costumes, so our costumer, Misha Perritt, with help from Meagan Castillo, built from scratch our Duloc dancer and rat costumes (using Ms. Ross' designs). Misha also had to adjust (and/or build) several new costumes for our actors.

Many of the props were included in the package, but had to be repainted, water proofed, or fixed. Our stage dragon was designed and built for another theater by the amazing Ken Michels. Our trail dragon was a family project by our props mistress, Melynda Malley, and her family.

Such are the behind-the-scenes stories of community theater – it takes an army of enthusiastic volunteers, a stellar production staff and a little luck and magic to pull off a show of this magnitude. We are pleased with the result – and hope that you are too! And a big shout out to everyone who has made this show possible, from staff to actors to musicians to the original designers. You rock!

Big Tree Trail

One of the delights of the Mountaineers' Kitsap Forest Theater is being surrounded by the Mountaineers Foundation Rhododendron Preserve - a 460 acre nature conservancy with over 70 acres of old-growth forest. Ancient western red cedars abound with many other trees, ferns and wildlife. One of the biggest trees on the Kitsap Peninsula is located on the preserve.

The trail to 'Big Tree' is about 1/2 mile long and starts near the historic Kitsap Cabin, ending at one of the 10 largest Douglas Fir trees in the world (2nd largest in Kitsap County). The tree is over 30' around. The hike takes you on a bridge over Wildcat Creek with views of Hidden Valley, blooming trillium, wild rhododendrons and many other native trees and plants. You feel as if you have entered another world.

If you hike the trail after the show, please be sure your car is not blocking anyone in. Please note that the first part of the trail is steep – wear walking shoes and enjoy your trek into another time and place!

MOUNTAINEERS PLAYERS HISTORY

The rich history of The Mountaineers Players and the Kitsap Forest Theater began on a Spring day in 1909. A 'local walk' to view the wild blooming rhododendrons around Wildcat Lake began one of The Mountaineers most enduring traditions. The 'misguided' group of 66 Mountaineers wandered into Hidden Valley Ranch and met Edward Paschall and his family. A fast friendship was forged on that day.

A prominent activity among early Mountaineers visitors involved dramatic diversions. Skits, pantomimes, kangaroo-courts, and mock-weddings were performed using props and costumes at hand. The first theatrical effort that had any continuity was a pantomime staging of the Legend of Sleepy Hollow in 1916. The headless horseman rode on a bright, moonlit Halloween night.

The skits and performances grew into a production of Robin of Sherwood on June 17, 1923. The audience moved from clearing to clearing as different scenes were presented. The performance marked the birth of The Mountaineers Players who went on to produce an annual spring show on the property every year to the present day - the only exception being four years during World War II.

The increasing size of the audience and the relatively uncomfortable accommodations spurred the movement to build a permanent theater facility. William C. Darling and the Players business manager Claire McGuire scouted the site of the present day Kitsap Forest Theater. The site was a level spot with a gentle upward slope near Chico Creek. The Mountaineers felled trees, carved terraced seats in the hillside and lugged cedar bark from the creek bottom under Mr. Darling's direction. The original design of the theater attempted to recreate a naturally occurring glade in the forest. Trees were thinned to allow streams of light to fall on the stage while keeping the audience shaded. Wings were constructed out of cedar bark covered with moss. A lush row of fern footlights and rhododendrons and dogwoods filling the back drop are just a few of the natural wonders of this unique space.

The Mountaineers Players are one of the oldest, continuously operating community theater groups in the country, performing in one of the oldest outdoor theaters in North America. See our web site for more history of these early shows.
