Director's Note

When I first imagined *A Midsummer Night's Dream* in Appalachia, I was struck by how naturally the world of Shakespeare's play fit into the history and spirit of the region. Appalachia in the 1960s was a place of struggle, resilience and folklore. Appalachia in the 1960s was marked by poverty, industrial upheaval, and environmental destruction but also by resilience, music, and a deep sense of honor.

Honor culture is a way of life where reputation and family pride carry enormous weight. Worth is measured by loyalty and by how fiercely one defends their name, and disobedience or insult demands a response. Dignity culture, on the other hand, sees self-worth as something inherent, with conflicts more often resolved through law or compromise than retaliation. Shakespeare's Athens, like Appalachia in the 1960s, was steeped in honor culture, and the consequences of that system shape every corner of *A Midsummer Night's Dream*.

At its heart *A Midsummer Night's Dream* is about what happens when honor collides with love. Hermia, Lysander, Helena, and Demetrius are trapped between duty and desire, torn between the rules laid down by family and the freedom they long to claim.

In our telling, the fae are not delicate winged creatures but wild animalistic forces. We have brought to life various versions of Appalachian cryptids, who feed on human emotion, bending love and rage and longing to their will. For them, music is magic. Every note is a spell, every song a spark that pushes the lovers deeper into chaos. At the center of their world are Titania and Oberon, locked in their own quarrel of pride and possession. Their stubbornness and jealousy ripple outward, touching every life in the forest. Titania and Oberon remind us that our own pride can sometimes wound the very people we care about most, and that reconciliation requires humility as much as love.

In this production, the "rude mechanicals" are Appalachian miners, men whose daily work in the coal mines was dangerous, grueling, and often thankless. Theatre gives them another kind of work, one built on laughter, teamwork, and love. Their performance of *Pyramus and Thisbe* may be far from perfect, but their persistence makes it powerful. They remind us that storytelling belongs to everyone, not just kings or fae. Even in the face of missing actors, magical spells, and costume malfunctions, the mechanicals refuse to give up. Their humor, their mistakes, and their joy celebrate the resilience of working people who create art out of love.

In our *Midsummer*, Hippolyta represents the Appalachian tradition She is proud, resilient and community focused. Theseus represents the force of industry. Their uneasy match reflects Appalachia itself, caught between honoring its culture and facing the weight of change.

The forest of Shakespeare's *Midsummer* transforms everyone who enters it, softening wounds and carrying hearts toward wonder. For me, this play is a dream of honor and pride, of music that unsettles, of laughter that heals. That healing laughter feels a lot like Kitsap Forest Theatre itself. This theatre is a place where community, joy, and imagination keep growing year after year. So I invite you to come get lost in the woods with us tonight, to laugh, to dream, and to carry a little of that magic with you when you leave.

Dramaturgy Note

Originally, *A Midsummer Night's Dream* takes place partly in the city of Athens and partly in the forest that lies beyond the city's walls. The city of Athens is portrayed as a place of order, rules, and civilization, while the forest is wild, anarchic, and chaotic. Our production, set in 1960s Appalachia, follows these themes. Our "Athens" is depicted in an unspecified civilized part of rural West Virginia, and our forest is a magic-imbued wood nearby.

Due to increased mechanization and the rise of strip mining in the area, many people lost their jobs to large coal mining companies. This time led to high levels of unemployment, poverty, and social unrest in our setting. Miners and their families organized protests and strikes, calling for better wages, working conditions, and the fulfillment of union responsibilities. Within this economic unrest also emerged strong community and geographical camaraderie, resulting in rich cultural music, folktales, and traditions.

The play contrasts the rigid structures of Athenian society with the more fluid and transformative space of the fairy world, where gender roles are sometimes inverted or blurred. We explore themes of honor vs. dignity, gender and power, and the many forms of transformation.

In our show, the humans and fae are part of the same ecosystem. When humans feel intense emotion, they create art. The fae feed on art, and thus are driven to tinker with our human characters to make them feel impassioned. Music is magic, and our fae are ready to feed.

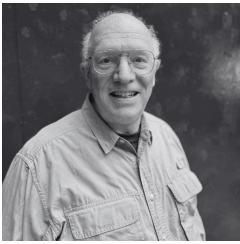
Meet the Athenians

The Mountaineers Players History 1923-2025

The rich history of The Mountaineers Players began on a spring day in 1909 when a 'local walk' by a group of 66 hikers to view the wild blooming rhododendrons around Wildcat Lake went astray. They wandered into hidden Valley Ranch, and met Edward Paschall and family, starting a fast friendship that began one of the Mountaineers most enduring traditions. Skits around campfires grew into a production of *Robin of Sherwood* on June 17, 1923, performed in the woods going from glade to glade with the audience following along.

Realizing the need for a permanent theater, Bill Darling and volunteers built the outdoor amphitheater in 1925-1926. This marked the birth of The Players who went on to produce the annual spring show every year except 4 years during World War II and 2020. A summer show was added in 2007 and a fall show in 2024. The Mountaineers players are one of the oldest, continuously operating community theater groups in the country, performing in one of the oldest outdoor theaters in North America.
