

BACKSTAGE WITH THE PLAYERS

This is the 59th year that the Mountaineer Players have brought a play to life amidst the blooming rhododendrons and dogwoods of the Forest Theatre and Wild Rhododendron Preserve. This long and distinguished history is a tribute to the talent, dedication and hard work of hundreds of Mountaineers.

Each year as the play is prepared and presented, behind-thescenes activities include electing the Players' leaders for the next year: chairman, vice-chairman, secretary, treasurer and committee members. This group will continue the tradition, and by late summer will be starting to line up sub-committees on play-selection, director-selection, obtaining performance rights, conducting auditions and rehearsals, creating sets, props and costumes, planning publicity, arranging for concessions, ushers, parking.

As opening day nears, special problems crop up, depending on the type of play being produced. If the script calls for a horse, it must be located and "borrowed" for several weekends, its entrances and exits must be arranged, its home between scenes and between performances must be provided. Sets may pose a special problem if the weather has been damp just before the play opens.

More than one actor has been warned, "Don't touch any sets. The paint is still wet."

In an outdoor theater, the weather is a constant concern. Most people would rather see the play on a sunny day than on a rainy one, but, in true theatrical tradition, the show goes on regardless of the weather. In 1980 *The Music Man* opened on a weekend that featured not only a generous amount of rain but also the second eruption of Mt. St. Helens, with a prediction (happily unfulfilled) that the wind would carry the ashfall directly over the Forest Theatre. That weekend the cast applauded the audience members who were daring enough to come to the play.

Many loyal audience members return year after year and the Players have great staying power, too. One 17-year-old Player has never missed the play, either as performer or spectator, in her entire life. A member of this year's cast, now 24, was in his first Mountaineer play at age three months, as a hand prop.

We hope you enjoy this day in the Forest Theatre and that you will plan to come back again next year on Memorial Day weekend (Sunday and Monday) or one of the following two weekends (June 4, 5, 11, and 12) when the Forest Theatre will again come to life.

Plan-ahead books:

Every hiker's library should have copies of this series of guides, covering every worthwhile scenic trail in the Cascades, the Olympic beaches, and the mountains of southwest B.C. Each is loaded with photos, sketch maps for each trip, details on the trails, mileages, elevations, best time of year. Indispensable and enjoyable books for those who would explore the Northwest.


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

AUTHOR OF THE ORIGINAL STORY

Jules Verne was the first writer to produce the kind of exciting stories that have now come to be called "science fiction." He was not only the first, but also the most famous, so much so that his name has become a by-word for adventure-story writing. Despite the proliferation of sciencefiction in our own time, tales of this kind are often described as being "a la Jules Verne."

Born in 1828 in the French seaport city of Nantes, he wrote his stories of travel and exploration without ever leaving that city except for brief trips to Paris. By reading books on science and travel, he was able to apply his vivid imagination to chronicling fictional journeys of the most wideranging sort. Some of his best-known works were "Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Sea," "A Voyage to the Center of the Earth," "The Mysterious Island," "Five Weeks in a Balloon," "Michael Strogoff," and "Around the World in 80 Days."

By the time of his death in 1905 at age 77, Verne had written 80 stories dealing with what seemed, at the time, to be wildly fanciful projections of scientific developments, but which have turned out to be sensibly prophetic -- such developments as television, submarines, rockets, airplanes, remote control, helicopter travel, and the atom bomb.

In Verne's time the notion of circling the world in 80 days seemed as wildly extravagant a piece of imagination as travelling 20,000 leagues under the sea. But the sheer drama of his tales continues to absorb readers.

IRVING ZIMMER The Mountaineer Players are pleased that Irving Zimmer, who is both performer and director, is doing his first outdoor show with them. His recent directing credits range from Moliere's "The Misanthrope" through several of Neil Simon's comedies, selections from "Canterbury Tales," plus "Kismet," "The Subject Was Roses" and a reading of "Under Milkwood" by Dylan Thomas. He staged the sword fight in a recent production of Monteverdi's 16th century opera, "Il Combattimento."

Irving's long list of performance credits includes Sir Toby Belch in Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night" and Big Jule in "Guys and Dolls." Last season he played in Auburn Avenue Act One's production of "The Fantasticks."

A native of San Francisco, Irving has a master's degree in audiology from Stanford University and is an audiologist for Tacoma School District. He lives on Mercer Island with his wife Rose and daughters Karen and Kathy.



BARBARA McCOY, Players Committee Chairman, has been active with the Mountaineer Players since 1968, performing in "A Connecticut Yankee in King Arthur's Court" along with her children, Kim, Craig, and Lorinda. Barbara has done costuming, been on Players Committee numerous times, and been involved in Mountaineer Players Winter Plays. Among her other drama activities, she produced "Look Homeward Angel" for the Edmonds Driftwood Players and attended the University of Washington.

The Players Committee are Mountaineer members with an interest in drama, volunteering their time to produce a play each spring for The Forest Theatre. During the fall and winter they present plays in our clubrooms and ski lodges. The Mountaineers' 215-acre rhododendron and forest preserve, in which The Forest Theatre is located, is being kept in its natural state for future generations to enjoy.

ALAN DOWNING, Players Committee Co-Chairman, resigned in March to take a new job in Ketchikan, Alaska, with his wife Nadine. Alan produced and directed Mountaineer Players Winter Plays and acted in several spring plays, including "Li'l Abner" in 1981. Alan came to us from North Carolina, where he was involved in community theatre.





The Mountaineers, organized in 1906 with 151 charter members, is the largest and one of the oldest outdoor clubs in the Pacific Northwest. The club operates Kitsap Lodge here in the Wild Rhododendron Preserve plus ski lodges at Mount Baker, Stevens, Snoqualmie and Stampede Passes and sponsors hundreds of events each year ranging from one-day nature walks to hiking/climbing expeditions in the Alps and other foreign locales.

The Mountaineers, founded in 1906, is an organization of 11,000 persons who endorse the club's purposes:


To explore and study the mountains, forests, and watercourses of the Northwest;
